Last month I had the honor to sit down with Allan Webber and interview him for March's Person of Interest. I apologize for when I read his story at the general membership meeting, I was missing a few bits of info for one page was missing from my report. I remembered most of what was on it. Below is the full story on Allan. Enjoy.

When I retired from full time work as a Crime Scene Investigator with the Marana Police Department, I said I was going to write a couple of books. I accomplished the first part of that promise to myself and wrote "Old School", the Police, the Public and the Pranks. It was sent to the publishing company here in Tucson back in November and is going to print the last week in March.

The book should be out mid-April. I plan on having a book signing at The Station bar on Silverbell & Wade sometime after that. I will keep you posted. I would sure appreciate it if you could help out a struggling author by purchasing the book. I promise you a few laughs as always.

Person Of Interest

Allan Webber

Allan was born on 10-20-49 in Chicago, IL. He has one sister and one half-sister. Allan is the oldest.

When he was born his mother was a small woman and he had to be pulled out resulting in slanted eyes.

Allan stated his childhood was pretty much normal. When he was in the 3rd grade his parents had Harleys.

Allan's father passed away in 1964 when he was only 14 years old. But his dad taught him to be tough. His dad told him that if someone hits you, hit 'em back harder. Allan got in a lot of fights.

After his father's death, Allan went to live with his grandpa in Ludlow, Illinois. His grandpa had a farm that had been in the family for 100 years.

But grandpa was very strict. He told Allan no sports, no girls, go to school then come home and work the farm.



In school Allan wanted to play the oboe but was told it was too expensive, so he settled on playing the alto sax. He got involved with the Thespians in drama class and liked it.

After Grandma died Allan's grandpa opened up a little bit. Allan ended up moving back in with his mother in Champaign and took the train back and forth from grandpa's.

At age 17, Allan got a job at International Register Company in their receiving department. He had to walk 5 miles to and from work.

Allan had received a scholarship in Social Economics but got drafted into the United States Army. Instead of going in the Army, Allan joined the U.S. Air Force.

As it was back in those days, recruiters promised you a job you wanted. But you never got that job, you had to take what they gave you. Allan wanted to work with computers but was told all those jobs were filled. How about something in Logistics, he inquired. Nope, all filled. So, Allan settled for what the Air Force wanted him to do—ground radio.

Allan was stationed in Korea in the DMZ. He had to drive around a Marine Lieutenant for one year. From there Allan went to Robins Air Force Base located just southeast of Macon, Georgia for 6 months.

Allan was then assigned to Louisiana for 3 years spending most of his time in the mobile control tower. It was while he was working there that he met his wife, Mary.

There was an L-shaped bar/restaurant just outside the base. Allan was there when some guy started harassing Mary. Allan stepped in and told the guy, "Leave her alone". The guy backed away and told Allan he had no call in this. Allan then asked Mary, "Will you marry me?" Mary replied yes and then the guy backed down. Allan and Mary were married in 1972 and that marriage produced three boys and 10 grandkids.

Allan had several assignments during his tenure in the Air Force. He had been stationed in Korea, Italy and Crete (Island of Greece). As a Staff Sgt. in San Antonio, Texas, Allan was a security spotter, then was an





Electronics Security Spotter. He took care of all mobile assets for the command. Allan's last assignment was at Davis Monthan here in Tucson and worked with ground launch missiles.

During his service Allan had considered leaving the Air Force and joining the Tucson Police Department. His mother told him to re-up and stay in, so Allan listened to his mother. The very next day after his re-enlistment Allan received a call from TPD.

Allan Webber received an honorable discharge in October 1989 after serving proudly for 20 years. He received a total of 5 medals during his career including a Meritorious Service Award, the highest award given at peace time.

Due to the work Allan did in the military, his knees and ears deteriorated. The noise from the jets took out his hearing. Allan received a partial disability pension at 30% disabled. The Disabled American Veterans (DAV) fought for him and got it upped to 50%. Allan was receiving shots at TMC for his knees and had to have a knee replacement. He now receives a 70% disability pension.

Allan went back to school at ITT in Tucson but due to his hearing disability no one would hire him. He worked briefly at a Wal-Mart store in Green Valley before going to work at Jensen's as a parts buyer and gunsmith. He was a range officer at the Prince Road location. Allan retired from the workforce in the mid-late '90s.

Sadly, in November of 2021, Allan's wife Mary passed away from pancreatic cancer. She died 8 days after being advised of her diagnosis.

INJURIES: Eyes, knee, joint disease, spinal injury, and skin cancer (nose).

TRAVELS: Germany, Greece (Crete), Italy, Korea, and many of the U.S. states. Allan has not however been to Canada or Mexico.

HOBBIES: Guns, swords, knives, and motorcycles.

AFFILIATIONS: Life member of the NRA, DAV, American Legion, USAF Sgts. Association, and Tucson HOG.

FAVORITE FOOD: Steak FAVORITE DRINK: Tea

Motorcycles: Like many HD riders, Allan had plenty of Japanese/foreign bikes. '74 Honda CB300, Triumph Tiger (while in Italy), Honda 750 (Italy), Suzuki 650 (one in Crete too), Yamaha, several more Hondas. A '71 FLT was his first Harley, an '84 & '85 FXRT, several more Harleys. At 69 years old he bought a M-109 Suzuki which was traded in for a Yamaha. That was traded in for a 2016 Heritage, then a Honda Gold Wing so his wife could tour with him. He also had a Switchback, a 2014 Softail deluxe and his current bike a 2021 Road King.

NICKNAME: Damned Yankee (given to him by his American Legion riders.

BUCKET LIST: Nothing. Then a minute later he said, Find Me A Woman.

IF HE COULD GO BACK IN TIME AND CHANGE ONE THING: Allan said he would never have drank.



















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
